This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

## Part A: Curriculum music

#### Intent

What will our pupils experience throughout their Expressive Arts curriculum at Longcause? We aim to create an environment where pupils are supported to express themselves safely and communicate meaningfully with others. We aim to inspire our pupils to cultivate their own personal interest in Expressive Arts, growing their cultural capital through a diverse and creative curriculum.

#### Why do we want this?

We strive to:

- Inspire positive personal expression in our students.
- Develop students ability to communicate with others confidently and effectively with others through a creative outlet
- Grow students' cultural capital through their experience of a wide range of creative cultural influences.

These strands are implemented weekly through Expressive Arts lessons on a rotation, changing every other term. Explorers primary students access Expressive Arts through an adapted curriculum every term that is highly influenced by and has strong links with the EYFS curriculum (see

EYFS links to Pre Scheme A.docx for details). To provide further opportunities for our pupils in KS4 and also those pupils across the whole school who show a specific interest and talent within Expressive Arts, further opportunities are provided for pupils to take part in a range of creative experiences including school choir, teacher led workshops, workshops with industry professionals, talent shows and live performances off site.

To ensure total coverage, each area (Music & Movement, Drama and Music), is taught through three schemes of work, following a progression where key skills are rehearsed and built upon. Ultimately, class teachers will assess the scheme that is best fit for their pupils although generally, Explorers Primary pupils access 'Pre Scheme A', Secondary Explorer and Primary Adventurers will access Scheme A and Secondary Adventures along with Pioneers will access Scheme B. This means that Children will access the whole curriculum and hone key skills throughout their time at school.

We recognise that Expressive Arts is a subject that lends itself well to cross curricular learning. Therefore we are keen to promote opportunities to extend and rehearse students' learning through other subjects, including but not limited to, Music with R.E, Drama within English and Music and Movement within PE.

#### Impact:

- Promotion of wellbeing and building self esteem through learning positive self expression
- Develop their communication and relationship building skills through engagement with peers and working towards a common goal
- Enrichment of pupils' cultural capital by exposing them to a range of performance art that they
  may not have encountered before as well as perhaps leading to a special interest that furthers
  wellbeing and supports personal relationships outside of school

Explorers primary - songs and rhymes throughout the day at the start and end of lessons as well as specific timetabled songs at least once a day

Explorers secondary - music curriculum

Adventurers - music block one term per year and music/movement one term per year

## Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

Guitar lessons - currently 5 pupils with tutoring.

Duke of Edinburgh - skills is music lessons

Guitars in school which pupils use to practise together (current Pioneers and Year 11)

Woodfest - opportunity for a group music workshop

African drummers - external provider attends the school in line with the curriculum for experience of another culture's music.

Indian dancers external provider attends the school in line with the curriculum for experience of another culture's dance with music.

# **Part C: Musical experiences**

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

Fortnightly assembly - all children attending sing together

Annual Longcause's got talent show where pupils get to showcase their music.

Concerts shows - Woodfest held at a local special school.

Musical theatre- Lion the Witch and the Wardrobe- April 2025 is booked.

# In the future

This is about what the school is planning for subsequent years.

We wish to improve our music provision for our pupils and intend to do so by the following:

- Use of an experienced TA (Italia Conti trained) to run Music, Drama and Dance workshops each lunch time as an extra curricular club.
- Use of a singing teacher to teach 1:1 singing lessons up to 5 children per week
- Improved offer of musical instrument tuition
- Improved use of the Local Music Hub for joint ventures and projects
- Musical performances termly
